Your book has taught me to treat everyone that way they want to be treated. My brother and everyone else in the world with diseases are just like you and me.

Even when Jack was a huge jerk to him, August stayed strong no matter what happened in his life. All kids pointing, laughing, and making weird faces at him, August dealt with it.
