Mary Garber was the first full-time woman sports writer and first female sports editor for a daily American newspaper.

In 1940, Mary began her career in journalism working for the *Twin City Sentinel* (later it became the *Winston-Salem Journal*) in North Carolina. Her shift to sports writing came in 1944 during World War II. After the war, Mary returned to reporting general news, but, in 1946, she was placed on the sports staff. As her career progressed, Mary covered many different sporting events. Even though she didn't have access to the locker room or the press box, Mary found other ways to get the story and gained respect for her writing and for her relentless persistence. In 1974, she was allowed access to the locker room.

Mary became the first many times during the course of her career. In 2002, she became the first woman to be inducted into the U.S. Basketball Writers Association Hall of Fame. In 2005, she was the first woman to receive the Associated Press Sports Editors Red Smith Award. That same year, she was the first woman to win the Associated Press Sports Editors Award. In 2008, Mary was inducted into the National Sportscasters and Sportswriters Association Hall of Fame. Each year, the Association for Women in Sports Media presents the Mary Garber Pioneering Award for female role models in sports journalism.

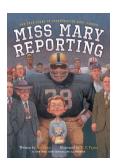

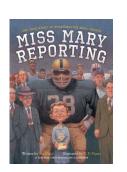
